The submission from Lipov, winner of the 14-years-of-age-and-younger category, features a family kayaking trip in Menorca, Spain. His explanation notes: “In the future, I will be adventurous ... I want to travel to many places around the world ... I see my life as an exciting journey that will never stop.”

Spicer, winner of the 15-years-of-age-and-older category, submitted a photo that illustrates a group of ducks and pigeons feeding on the ground, with one pigeon that breaks free from the pack and begins to fly. In his corresponding essay, Spicer likens himself to that bird, recalling that after factor VIII concentrate for hemophilia became available, “It let me spread my wings

for the first time ... tomorrow, the treatment for hemophilia will be like the wings on the bird. It will let us soar to reach our true potential.”

“In my lifetime, I’ve witnessed incredible advancements in hemophilia care, allowing me to never be held back by my hemophilia, evidenced by my career as a race-car driver,” said Curtis Spicer. “This contest enabled me to reflect on my opportunities and accomplishments and I encourage others to live life to the fullest.”
